WHAT HAPPENED?

Ohio experienced severe weather on **May 27-29, 2019** including an outbreak of **21 tornadoes and flooding**. Impacts from the storm occurred statewide, with the most severe effects in west-central

Ohio, surrounding the greater **Dayton area**. In response the State EOC partially activated at 8:45 a.m. on May 28. State EOC activated from May 28- June 11, 2019. Severe weather including 21 tornadoes and flooding.

These storms destroyed and damaged structures, closed roads and resulted in extended utility outages. The

State Emergency Operations Center executed **42 missions** including search and rescue, emergency provision of commodities and power, provision of social services and debris removal. The State EOC coordinated technical assistance for the restoration of public water systems, damage assessments, fire suppression, sheltering operations, commodity distribution, and debris removal. The Joint Information Center provided information to the public via traditional and social media throughout the activation. A state emergency

declaration was issued on May 28. **A federal disaster declaration** was issued on June 18. The State EOC remained partially activated until June 11 and state debris removal missions did not conclude until September 5.



Exercises


The exercise program implemented and managed by the Ohio EMA provides first responders, emergency managers, public health and service providers, volunteers, elected officials, private industry and others with the skills necessary to protect life and property through coordinated exercises in response to simulated, natural and/or man-made disaster scenarios.

The goal of the exercise program is to improve the overall readiness and capabilities of emergency response by validating training, emergency plans, and procedures to identify strengths and areas for improvement, demonstrate operational capabilities, and to prepare personnel to respond to real world incidents, regardless of the threat or hazard. This is accomplished through the implementation of the building block approach for exercises and exercise activities, including seminars, workshops, tabletop exercises, drills, functional exercises, and full-scale exercises.


WHAT IS NIMS?

The National Incident Management System (NIMS) guides all levels of government, non-governmental organizations (NGO), and the private sector to work together to prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from incidents. (ORC 5502.28)

NIMS applies to all incidents, from traffic accidents to major disasters.
